

Since May of 2023 **every month** has been the hottest that month has ever been.






BIODIVERSITY LOSS

Almost **500 species** have gone extinct in the last decade...

Scientists predict that we will begin to lose 200-1,000 species every year





INDIGENOUS GROUPS

The Jean Charles Choctaw Nation is one of the first **climate-displaced communities** in the U.S.

They have lost **98%** of their ancestral lands to rising sea levels swallowing the Isle they inhabit.

Hurricane Milton makes landfall in west Florida with top wind speeds of **150 mph** and storm surges of **8-10 ft**.

<u>CAUSE</u>: Human activities, principally through emissions of greenhouse gases, have unequivocally caused global warming

<u>INJUSTICE</u> Vulnerable communities who have historically contributed the least to current climate change are disproportionately affected






WARNING:Every increment of global warming will intensify multiple and concurrent hazards





The countries with the largest cumulative CO2 emissions since 1750



- 1. Does the candidate **acknowledge** climate change and biodiversity loss? How much does the candidate **prioritize** these issues?
- 2. Does the candidate **receive funding** from those pushing back against efforts address these problems?
- 3. What is **the record** of candidates regarding climate action?
- 4. Does the candidate express a **desire to work with global partners** to solve problems of climate and biodiversity?
- 5. Does the candidate actively reach out and **listen to those most affected** by climate change and biodiversity loss?
